Asian Studies Program in 2016-17

The Asian Studies Program (ASIA) begins its sixth year at UMBC and has moved into new quarters on the 5th floor in the renovated Fine Arts Building (South wing).

67 students (49 majors and 18 minors) are enrolled in the program as of summer 2016.

It is ASIA's mission to serve as a truly interdisciplinary program. This past academic year ASIA connected with more than a dozen other departments, programs and centers, as detailed below:

Sept. 3, 2015: Cosponsored a public reception with the state of Maryland sister state programs from South Korea, China and Japan in welcoming the First Lady of Maryland, Mrs. Yumi Hogan. ASIA worked closely with Maryland officials from the Department of State in organizing this event. As a result of this effort, Director Vaporis was invited to become a member of the Anhui (China)-Maryland Sister State Committee to work on educational exchanges between Anhui and Maryland.

October 17, 2015: Asian Studies cosponsored with the Department of History "UMBC's 1st Symposium on Asian History/ Asian Studies" for faculty and students in the Chesapeake Bay region. Over 50 people, including area secondary school teachers, attended the Saturday morning event.

April 13, 2016: Asian Studies co-sponsored (with Visual Arts and Gender and Women's Studies) the Humanities Forum with Ram Devineni, filmmaker, who spoke on: Can A Comic Book Superhero and Rape Survivor Change Attitudes Toward Sexual Violence?

April 18: Cosponsored (with the Department of English) a reading by Vietnamese-American poet Ocean Vuong.

April 21: Asian Studies was the principal sponsor, along with cosponsors Department of Geography and Environmental Systems and the History Department, of a lecture by Brett Walker, "Natural and Unnatural Disasters: 3/11, Asbestos, and the Unmaking of Japan's Modern World."

ASIA continues its mission to bring the arts of Asia to UMBC by offering classes in Indian dance by renown dancer Shobha Subramanian together with our co-sponsor, the Dance Department. Asian Studies is also co-sponsoring classes in Gamelan with the Music Department. New Assistant Professor of Chinese History Joins UMBC



Dr. Song holds a BA in Chinese Language and Literature from the University of International Relations (China), a M.Sc. in Comparative Politics from the London School of Economics and a Ph.D. in Chinese History from the University of Chicago. He recently completed his third year as a Mellon Postdoctoral Fellow (and in 2013-2014 also as an SSRC fellow) at Vassar College. Dr. Song is an especially promising historian of Chinese History, Inter-Asian History, and Transnational History. A native of China, he is fluent in Mandarin Chinese, with research knowledge of Japanese and Korean. His research is based on work in Chinese, Korean and Japanese archives.

Faculty News

Bambi Chapin: Dr. Chapin received funding from an NSF grant through UMBC in 2015-16 to concentrate on establishing new lines of research focused on Sri Lankan heritage families in the U.S. and in Sri Lanka. As part of this, she spent January 2016 in Sri Lanka conducting field research on mothering and childbirth, which built on her previous work there. Over the year, she plans to develop these new lines of research, presenting preliminary results on the socialization of mothers at the Annual Conference on South Asia in Madison, Wisconsin in October as well as a paper at the American Anthropology Association's Annual Meeting in November.

Brian Grodsky: His new book will be published with Rowman & Littlefield in early August, entitled, *The Democratization Disconnect: How Recent Democratic Revolutions Threaten the Future of Democracy.* Dr. Grodsky attended the Japan Studies Association Freeman Foundation Summer Institute, University of Hawaii, May/June 2016.

David Mitch: Attended the Japan Studies Association Freeman Foundation Summer Institute, University of Hawaii, May/June 2016. He organized and presented at a session entitled "Diverse Routes to Schooling for All" at the 2015 World Economic History Congress held in Kyoto, Japan in August, 2015. He also served as a discussant at the meeting of Anglo-Japanese Historians conference held in Osaka, Japan in August, 2015;

Manil Suri: Has written two op-eds on India for the New York Times (See the ones on Mar 15, 2016, Aug 3, 2015, and Jun 19, 2015 at http://www.nytimes.com/column/manil-suri). In addition, his play, "The Mathematics of Being Human" was performed in New Delhi at the US Center by Atelier Productions, with an excerpt performed in Mumbai (both in January, 2016). Dr. Suri was an invited speaker at the Jaipur Literary Festival in Boulder (Sep, 2015) and at the Lit for Life book festival in Chennai, India (Jan 2016).

Constantine Vaporis: was selected for ASIANetwork's Speakers Bureau, 2017-19. (ASIANetworks is a consortium of 160 colleges and universities with Asian Studies programs). He served as an Instructor for two three-day courses entitled "Asia Pacific" for the National Geophysical Intelligence Agency, delivered at NGA headquarters, Springfield, VA and St. Louis, MO, July 2016; presented "The Edo Man and the Satsuma Sweet Potato. Early Modern Travel through a Japanese Prism," an invited lecture for the inaugural lecture series for the Center for Integrated Study of Japan, University of Pennsylvania, November 12, 2015, published an article, Mapping the 'Arms and Legs of the Realm; in Kären Wigen, Fumiko Sugimoto, and Cary Karacas, ed., Cartographic Japan: A Reader. (University of Chicago Press, 2015); and published "A Trip to be Remembered: Obama in Japan and Vietnam" in *The Conversation*, May 25, 2016.

Fan Yang: Dr. Yang's book, Faked in China: Nation Branding, Counterfeit Culture, and Globalization, was published by Indiana University Press in November 2015, as part of the Global Research Series funded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. Her article, "Under the Dome: 'Chinese' Smog as a Viral Media Event," appeared in the journal Critical Studies in Media Communication. She also contributed a chapter, "The Chinese Dream: A Global-national Ideological Formation," to the edited volume Commercial Nationalism: Selling the Nation and Nationalizing the Sell (Palgrave Macmillan, 2015). In addition to delivering a book talk at the College of William and Mary and presenting papers at several conferences, Dr. Yang also conducted a seminar, "China and/in Globalization," at the Third Association for Cultural Studies Institute 2015: Precarious Futures, Bloemfontein, South Africa in December, 2015.
