Step 1: Know Yourself

- Take a <u>career assessment</u>, such as the MBTI or FOCUS 2
- Schedule a 60-min career counseling appointment

- Available to all majors
- Full-time OR part-time
- Often are paid
- Earn academic credit
- In-person, virtual or hybrid

Tell us about your internship, co-op, or research opportunity, including your day-to-day responsibilities.

As a librarian technician intern at the National Gallery of Art's Vertical Files, I am tasked with working with the collection's ephemera—which are materials that were produced with the intent of being disposed of or only had short-term usefulness. These artist materials, such as exhibition notices, pamphlets, among other written works, are valuable to researchers, scholars and the curious public alike.

I largely do telework linking Library of Congress name headers to the artists in the Vertical Files, but I also do work for other departments of the library such as book items for the Circulation Dept.

 - Governor's Summer Internship Program (GSIP)

 - Fall/spring only
 - Entrepreneurship & social entrepreneurship
- UMBC Student Internship & Service Fund
 - Summer only; stipends for otherwise-unpaid experiences

Special Research Programs at UMBC

- Undergraduate Research & Creative Achievement Day (URCAD)
 - ALL MAJORS can present their research projects
 - Third week in April every year
- Undergraduate Research Awards (URA)
 - Year-long, apply in the spring for stipends of up to \$1,500
 - Must be mentored by UMBC faculty
- Interdisciplinary Co-Labs
 - Summer only; stipends of \$3,000
- Louis Stokes Alliance for Minority Participation (LSAMP)
 - All semesters; stipends for STEM research under UMBC faculty



Service-Learning

- ~40 hours per semester
- Education, human services, animal welfare, environment, international ed, food and housing, disability advocacy, healthcare
- Earn a transcript notation through PRAC 096

- Service-Learning & Community Engagement
 - Every semester; select a site that aligns with your interests
 - Engage alongside fellow students, reflect on your experience

- Scholarships for Service
 - Summer only; stipends of \$3,000
- Peace Corps Prep @ UMBC
 - Get prepared for international development work

- Promote your services on platforms like <u>UpWork</u> and <u>Fiverr</u>
- Can freelancing be listed on your resume? YES!

Plan for Potential Roadblocks

"I DON'T HAVE TRANSPORTATION OFF-CAMPUS."

Remote internships & service have expanded, plus UMBC provides shuttle service to Baltimore. Also, consider on-campus opportunities.

"I NEED TO KEEP MY CURRENT JOB."

Consider asking your employer to incorporate duties that relate to your career goals, or even allow you to intern within the company.

"MY GPA ISN'T THE GREATEST."

In some fields, GPA is less important than skills & experience. You can also consider building up your resume with non-competitive experiences.
